These towering, relocatable structures can be high as 12 meters and last from 60 to 80 vears. It is tradition that the bamboos used as frames for the huts are cut during moonlight. The roof is insulated with thatch made up of false banana (Enset), grass and cover of the bamboo stem. Eventually termites destroy the huts' basements, but the huts can be lifted and relocated, leaving the rotten part behind. This is why they are built so high and why the older houses are shorter. There are different types of houses, some big ones with different rooms and smaller one-purpose huts such as kitchens. The Dorze also have livestock which have a place in the huts.

The Dorze wear colorful toga robes called shammas. Music and dance are part of their culture. The Dorze used to be warriors.
